OUR SINGING RESIDENTS

Warming weather invites us to spend more time outside walking, soaking up sun on our decks or gardening. If you listen, there's beautiful music—something singing to you in Sunset Ridge. The song goes like this: "Chick a dee dee dee, chick a dee dee dee." If you return the song, often you hear a response.

Black-capped chickadees are non-migratory birds. We are lucky they make their homes in Sunset Ridge. They are easily identified by the black cap on their heads, black bib underneath and white cheeks. They are 4.5 to 6 inches long.



They fly from tree to tree and also often can be observed on lower plants and bird feeders. Once you recognize them and their song, you will enjoy them every day. Curious and friendly, they can be tempted to eat birdseed from your hand.

In summer, chickadees eat caterpillars and other insects they catch in the air. They also eat spiders, snails, other invertebrates, berries and sometimes seeds from pines. In winter, they feed on insects (especially the eggs and pupae) seeds (like juniper and sunflower seeds from bird feeders), berries and small fruits.

Very resourceful, they hide food for later recovery. Each item is placed in a different spot— the chickadee can remember the hiding places a month after catching the food!

Sunset Ridge is also home to many chickadee predators including hawks, snakes, weasels, chipmunks, mice, squirrels, cats and owls.

One male mates for life with one female. They nest in tree cavities lined with moss, leaves or other vegetation. Chickadee eggs are white with fine spots of reddish brown. Their chicks grow quickly and fledge in 14-18 days. The average lifespan is less than two to three years. The oldest male on record lived for over 11.5 years.

Hanging out in small groups, they establish a "pecking order." Rank is set by the degree of aggressiveness. All birds of the flock are subordinate to the most aggressive bird, and the poor lowest ranking chickadee is subordinate to all others.

Chickadees are not just beautiful and melodious: they are extremely important residents of Sunset Ridge. They control pests, pollinate plants and distribute seeds. Keep your eyes and ears open and enjoy our wonderful chickadees.

RECYCLING UPDATE

From the Ken-Caryl Ranch e-News:

Ken-Caryl Ranch officially transitions to bi-weekly recycling collection service on May 1. Residents with scheduled recycling pick-ups the week of April 19-May 2 will not be impacted and recycling will be picked up on those days.

Beginning the following week of May 6, recycling collection services for Ken-Caryl Ranch residents will officially adhere to the bi-weekly schedule; there will be no recycling collection services this week. Recycling will then resume the week of May 13 and will continue to alternate.

For Sunset Ridge residents - on Wednesday May 8 there will be no recycle pickup. The next week on Wednesday May 15, there will be recycle collection and it continues every other week. Recycling must be in the required Waste Management container to be collected.

Electric Panel Safety

Electric panels are the metal boxes outside our units with a door containing home breaker switches. Inside, you'll find a main current breaker that controls power to the entire house and individual breakers, each responsible for electricity to a specific part of your home. Panels are designed to "trip" as a safety measure—think fire danger—if your circuits are overloaded or malfunctioning.

The original electric panels in Sunset Ridge, installed when our units were built in the 1980s, are outdated. They need to be upgraded by a Master Electrician. Insurance companies ask about electric panels, and they will most likely be required to be updated if you sell your home. Residents have begun replacing their panels, and the prices vary from approximately \$3,500 to \$5000 depending on the scope of the work. It's a good idea to get three detailed estimates from Master Electricians before you replace your panel.
